Introduction

The visualisation tool in ELECT THB WP3 task 3.2 has been developed to assist law enforcement and prosecutors to better untangle the trafficking chain. The tool can be used to summarise and present the full picture of a particular case/crime in the pre-trial investigation file and in court proceedings. The idea for developing the tool came from law enforcement authorities themselves as a way to clarify and present complicated cases in a more accessible format, in particular during prosecution and in court.

Experienced concept designers from the Helsinki-based Ghostcompany were hired to assist in creating the visualisation tool and making sure it is easy to use, logical and has the required elements in order to summarise the results of investigations in a visual manner. The visualisation tool has been developed in a close cooperation with police, prosecutors and labour inspectors and other authorities and actors, such as victim services. The original plan foresaw the organisation of two meetings to first brainstorm on the format and the mandatory elements and then to collect feedback on the draft tool prepared before it was finalised. The first meeting was replaced by online HowSpace survey which was used for the brain storming part. The second workshop was organised on 8 May 2023.











HowSpace Survey

The first meeting to brainstorm the contents and ideas for the visualisation tool was replaced by online HowSpace survey which was used to collect feedback from different experts and practitioners such as the police, prosecutors, labour inspectors, tax authorities, National Assistance System for Victims of Trafficking and Victims Support Finland.

The survey covered issues such as what are the key factors in ensuring successful investigations, what are the key challenges in detection and investigation of human trafficking cases, what kind of challenges in collecting evidence regarding financial flows and confiscation of assets, and challenges in securing evidence of abusive recruitment, including paying illegal recruitment costs and challenges in international cooperation the experts have encountered etc. This process allowed the busy experts to take part in the process in a more flexible way than attending two workshops as was originally planned. 16 responses were collected via the survey and the information was saved in Excel for further use.





Workshop

The workshop for developing a visualisation tool for human trafficking investigations took place on 8 May 2023 in Helsinki. The ELECT-THB-project partner HEUNI brought together representatives from the police, prosecution service, NGOs, and the National Assistance System for Victims of Trafficking to draft a visualisation tool for better and more effective criminal investigations in human trafficking cases. 14 people attended the workshop.

The experts were introduced to the process of developing a visualisation tool by two experts from Ghostcompany, Strategic Growth Advisor Jussi Tapio and Business Designer Miikka Leinonen. The main goal of the workshop was to together come up with ideas and develop them towards an effective and beneficial tool to better investigate a suspicion of human trafficking or labour exploitation case. The work was based on the data collected from various law enforcement and authority representatives and other experts and practitioners through a HowSpace survey.

The facilitators from Ghostcompany begun the workshop by educating the experts about effective visualisation and the key issues to keep in mind when developing the visualisation tool. For example, the tool ought to be considered as an assistance mechanism to the investigation, and it should not be too complex to use. The experts were also introduced to different kinds of visualisation designs as an example of the variety of design possibilities.

After this brief introduction, the facilitators from Ghostcompany presented their draft for a visualisation tool for human trafficking investigations. The draft was thoroughly discussed and considered functional in its entirety. For example, it was widely thought that the tool could be helpful for a police officer who has little or no previous knowledge about the complexity of the trafficking crime. It was also considered important that using the tool would not require the investigator to already be aware of the circumstances of the case.

Thereafter, the experts were able to first discuss in small groups and then work at HowSpace to further improve the visualisation tool. The focus of this part of the workshop was first to consider what kinds of means of exploitation could come up in a criminal investigation – in other words, what should be looked for during an investigation. The considered means included e.g., debt bondage, violence or threat of violence, underpayment, and psychological control. Second, the experts considered what issues could cause an obstacle in recognizing labour exploitation or human trafficking. Many issues were thought of, e.g. the victim's mistrust in officials, cultural differences, and problems with interpretation.

Later, it was discussed how to overcome these obstacles. Many concrete ways were discovered, such as the possibility for the suspected victim to talk with NGOs and officials trained to encounter a trafficking victim or making use of the Incomes Register and other similar registers. At the end of the workshop, the experts focused on what other matters the visualisation tool should include, and how to further advance it for better investigations of human trafficking cases.

Feedback collected was very good (see next slides). The scale used was 1= strongly disagree 5= strongly agree.











Feedback from participants

- Very good workshop, easy to praise. The tool was, frankly, better than I expected a brought to evaluate a complex entity.
 Very versatile with minor modifications.
- The way of working, the facilitation and, for example, the use of Howspace as a group work method were really good. I liked the background work that the guys at Ghost had done by filling in the specs of the current forced labor case into the tool sketch. Nice event, not too long.
- The time allotted for the workshop is too short. The initial conversation took too much time. At first, it would have been good to go through what the purpose of the workshop is. Now it seemed that the organizers did not want to accept development proposals, even though the assumption was that it was about planning work.
- The workshop was very good, it was good to have a versatile and professional team! The tool itself seemed good and functional, so it's still ready.
- The workshop was quite short. It would have needed a more structured discussion about the purpose of the tool and the
 continuation of the workshop, or alternatively to guide advance preparation

























Visualisation tool could help summarise and make better sense of complex cases in my own work (Average score = 4.8)











Conclusions

- There is a lot of potential developing the model further, the initial process with the Ghostcompany and the results from the feedback survey indicate that the experts involved felt that the visualisation tool would be useful in their line or work and in presenting complex cases e.g. in court.
- Overall, the draft model presented, the way of working, the facilitation and the use of Howspace as a group work method received positive feedback from the participants. Criticism regarding the shortness of the workshop was also received from two respondents.
- It is clear that the initial budget reserved for this activity was very limited, so it allowed us to only the take the first step in developing the visualisation tool. Should there be some budget savings, we could potentially hire the Ghostcompany to to do some further steps in incorporating the aspects covered in HowSpace better in the model and to organise another workshop and to further develop the model in close cooperation with police, prosecutors and other relevant authorities and actors.











- Here is an example on how to use this model with a real case, the case in question is a recent one in Finland. The National Bureau of Investigation and the National Criminal Police of Estonia have investigated together aggravated trafficking in human beings involving companies with links to the construction industry. It is suspected that an organisation consisting of different companies and individuals has deceived several dozen workers into coming to work in Finland in circumstances such as forced labour and has gained criminal proceeds of over 2.3 million euros from this It is suspected that foreign workers were lured to Finland from Latvia and Estonia to work here in circumstances such as forced labour.
- In this scheme we've put the crucial details to show how the official business model differs from the real operating model and what methods were used by the perpetrators.
- In this particular case it also interesting that the victims were forced to be registered as "Light entrepreneurs", this particular way of employment arrangement is now on the rise in Finland. Employers blur the boundary between the employment relationship and the assignment relationship and increasingly transfer their obligations to employees. The State Regional Administrative Agencies' occupational safety and health authority alone found over 400 'light entrepreneurs' during its 71 control visits last year. Other authorities that carry out control activities have also discovered employment relationships that employers have attempted to disguise as entrepreneurship.




- Taking advantage of the dependent position of the employees due to lack of language skills and lack of resources.
